

## **NUTILIS CLEAR - NEW SCOOP AND MIXING INSTRUCTIONS**

Thickened drinks are changing from 'stage 1, 2 and 3' to IDDSI\* levels 1-4.


## What does this mean for you?

The new tin will be available in community pharmacies from mid-May 2018. New tins will have a red sticker on the lid, a smaller new green scoop in the tin, and the new IDDSI directions for use on the label.

This change affects the number of scoops required to thicken drinks. Please see the chart below showing how many of the new scoops to use.

## Previous Directions for use:

| Stage 3  Needs to be taken with a spoon                  | 3 (9g)   |

| New Levels<br>per 200ml           | New green scoop<br>No. of scoops |
| IDDSI Level 1<br>Slightly thick   | 1 (1.25g)                        |
| IDDSI Level 2<br>Mildly thick     | 2 (2.5g)                         |
| IDDSI Level 3<br>Moderately thick | 3 (3.75g)                        |
| IDDSI Level 4 Extremely thick     | 7 (8.75g)                        |

Please follow the guidance on the above conversion chart.

The drink may appear slightly thicker or thinner than you are used to.
